This is due to a range of individual factors including the quality of some of their key outcomes and for some schools, the capacity of leadership. All are making improvements which we hope will be recognised by Ofsted at their visit. 16 Northumberland maintained schools currently 'Require Improvement', of those 1 has received monitoring visits 9 are expected to be judged as 'Taking effective actions'. There are 7 Academies that 'Require Improvement', of those 1 has received a monitoring visit and was deemed by Ofsted to not be Taking effective actions; whilst 2 were deemed to be Taking effective actions; whilst 2 were deemed to be Taking effective action. There are 3 inadequate schools which are already Academies, whilst 1 school which was due to become an Academy order revoked. Academies are not in the control of the Local Authority and therefore the LA cannot intervene to drive forward improvement. There are currently 37 academies in Northumberland and this figure is set to grow. There are currently 131 'Good or Outstanding' schools in Northumberland. ACTIONS: All 6 schools are receiving additional support from the LA central teams. Each of these schools are part of the LA priority group.
