JOINT STRATEGIC NEEDS ASSESSMENT FOR SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS AND DISABILITY

Purpose of Report

This report further informs the Health and Wellbeing Board of the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (JSNA) for Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) 0 to 25 Years progress. This follows an earlier version presented to the Board in February 2018. It should also assist the decision making process concerning commissioning on a multi-agency basis.

This report is relevant to the Health and Wellbeing priority included in the draft NCC Corporate Plan.

Key Issues

The Joint Strategic Needs Assessment is a statutory requirement for all areas.

Similar to some other areas, Northumberland has decided to undertake a specific needs assessment in relation to children and young people who have special educational needs and disabilities.

The first iteration was a summary and Board members were advised that it was an emerging needs assessment that focused heavily at the time on prevalence and outcome information sourced from the education service.

However, supporting those with SEND encompasses a wider range of services than education and as such, this iteration now includes information on the prevalence of SEND with those involved with: the looked after system; child protection plans; children in need; of the social work service; SEND support services; CAMHS (or CYPS); and those in receipt of personal budgets.

It also includes information on where those children and young people live and what forms of provision they are using for their education. In the case of some, it also describes what year round accommodation they are living in, whether that be within the county or outside its boundaries.

It is essential that all partners read and note the contents of the updated needs assessment and where necessary take the messages about prevalence of need back to their own agencies so they can assess if further data and narrative should be added and the implications for commissioning.
