The notice was only put up outside on Friday 24 August if we had not seen this we would not have been aware of the application. Concerns about noise levels regarding live music as the notice states till 12AM but online it is 1AM. also the keowest to stay, naker than on every bank holiday Sunday, new year and boxing day. this is a cafe or a nightclub. also recorded music to be played outside. this is a residential street. Concern about noise from outside seating area and smokers entering/leaving premises. The cafe is 10 bigger than the size of a front room, walkways are narrow inside, is there room to set up artish/s and equipment without fire risk. Seating outside already causes an obstruction on a narrow footpath. (A board as well) for wheelchairs, prams and generally people using. There are already 2 pubs in the area where there is late night noise and this will increase if people are leaving the cafe late at night/early hours of the morning.
