<u>Key issues</u>

The Animal Welfare (Licensing of Activities Involving Animals) (England) Regulations 2018 were published on 1st February 2018 and are expected to come into force on 1st October 2018

The Regulations are to harmonise a number of existing Acts under one licensing regime.

Government guidance and further regulations are expected prior to the implementation date.

Background

Northumberland County Council currently issue licences under the following Acts of Parliament.

- Pet Animal Act 1951 as amended in 1983
- Animal Boarding Establishment Act 1963
- The Performing Animals (regulation) Act 1925
- Breeding and Sales of Dogs (welfare) Act 1999, Breeding of Dogs Act 1991 And Breeding of Dogs Act 1973

It should be noted that the number of performing animal licences is artificially high, as it is each individual trainer who requires a licence. One premises may have a number of licensed trainers.

Once an animal is licensed under the The Performing Animals (regulation) Act 1925 there is currently no provision to carry out annual inspections; therefore a premises becomes self regulating. The new regulations contain an annual fee and inspection regime.

The increase of Home Boarding has overtaken the more historical provision of boarding establishments; however the current Act did not properly legislate for this modern method of dog care. This new regulation specifically includes home boarding and dog creches and provides appropriate guidance and conditions.

The new regulations will encompass more dog breeders due to a change in the definitions of what a constitutes a dog breeder. Previously dog breeders only required licensing if they had five breeding bitches, each individual bitch had a litter of puppies and they sold for profit. Under the new regulations a licence will be required where they breed three or more litters of puppies in any 12-month period or where they are breeding dogs and advertising a business of selling dogs.

Under the new regulations there will be clearer, joint approach to dealing with issue covered by both the new legislation and the Animal Welfare Act 2016
