


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COVID-19 Boosters and Flu Jabs

- Remains two separate programmes, running alongside each other
 - Phase 5 of the COVID-19 vaccination programme
 - Annual seasonal flu programme
- Commenced early September, prioritising our most vulnerable residents
- Key points of **similarity** and **difference** to be aware of:
 - Eligibility
 - Access
 - Delivery
 - Co-administration




COVID-19 Booster Vaccinations


- Phase 5 of the national COVID-19 vaccination programme
- Eligible patient cohorts:
 - Residents and staff in care homes for older adults.
 - Frontline health and social care workers
 - All adults aged 50 and over
 - Persons aged 5 to 49 in a clinical risk group or who are household contacts of people with immunosuppression
 - Persons aged 16 to 49 who are carers
- Enhanced Service Specifications published for Primary Care Network (PCN) and Community Pharmacy participation, plus selected Hospital Hub sites
- 21 designated sites across Northumberland

COVID-19 vaccination in Northumberland





- 11 Primary Care Network local vaccination services
- 10 Community Pharmacies
- 1 Hospital Hub (for Health & Care staff)
- 1 Roving Vaccine Unit
- 1 School age Immunisation Service (multiple teams)
- + Community Nursing & roving teams (for care home & housebound patients)
- and hyperlocal pop-up clinics





Bivalent Vaccines

- Updated versions of the mRNA COVID-19 vaccines
- Pfizer (Comirnaty) and Moderna (Spikevax) bivalent products approved for use by MHRA
- Half the dose targets the original 'wild-type' virus strain, and the other half targets the Omicron variant (BA.1)
- Trial data shows that bivalent boosters trigger a strong immune response against both the original strain and Omicron
- Side effects similar to those seen for the original Pfizer and Moderna products – typically mild and self resolving
- For those patients who cannot have mRNA vaccines due to clinical risks (e.g. allergic reactions) the Novavax vaccine (Nuvaxovid) is available





Access & delivery models

- Two access routes for appointments:
 - 1. National Booking Service (NBS) online and 119 all Community Pharmacy sites and some PCN sites
 - 2. Local booking PCN sites and local GP pop-up clinics
- National invitation letters and SMS have currently been sent to all over 65 and at risk patients
- Letters/SMS signpost patients to NBS this does not include visibility of locally booked appointments which can give a false impression of availability
- PCNs using local booking are offering appointments to eligible cohorts in priority order
- More letters/SMS have been sent than there are appointments currently available in the system, however supplies are delivered weekly and appointments added



COVID-19 Booster Uptake

- Building on an excellent track record of uptake from Northumberland residents across all previous phases
- Strong initial uptake, ahead of the North East & North Cumbria (NENC) average
- Care Home residents continue to be the top priority
- Over 56% of over 75s already vaccinated
- Frontline health and social care worker uptake ahead of the NENC average – over 17%
- Important that public confidence and trust in the programme is maintained and uptake continues to be promoted
- With cases and hospital admissions rising, vaccination is our best way of protecting our residents from serious illness as a result of COVID-19





Key messages for COVID-19 Boosters

- Please be patient, you will not be missed
- There will be a vaccine for all eligible patients
- If NBS appointments are inconvenient, patients should
 - try again at a later date when more appointments will have been added
 - OR wait to be contacted by their local PCN or GP practice
- Please do not contact your GP practice to ask for a vaccine, they will contact you
- Some people may be eligible for both COVID-19 and flu vaccines
- If you are offered both at the same time, it's safe to have them together
- However, please get each vaccination as soon as you can to ensure you are fully protected, rather than waiting as it may not always be possible to get them both together.
- Please be patient, you will not be missed



Seasonal Influenza Programme

- National Seasonal Influenza Enhanced Service Specification 2022/23
- Eligible cohorts aligned with the COVID-19 booster programme plus:
 - Pregnant women
 - Children aged 2 to 3
 - All primary school children
 - Secondary school children in school years 7, 8, and 9
- All 36 Northumberland GP practices signed up to deliver the enhanced service specification for adults and 2-3 year olds
- Community Pharmacies also delivering flu vaccinations
- School age Immunisation Service (SAIS) providing vaccinations for school age children





Flu vaccination uptake

- Northumberland has an excellent track record of delivering high uptake of fluvaccinations
- Flu vaccine supplies began arriving around 3 weeks ago
- Initial performance so far is in line with, and in some cohorts slightly ahead of, uptake seen in 2021
- Over 47% of over 65s already vaccinated leading the way across NENC
- Care Home residents continue to be top priority providers are working hard to co-administer alongside COVID-19 boosters
- No significant issues with supply of vaccine or availability of appointments
- A number of providers are offering co-administration with COVID-19 boosters where supplies allow, however people should get each vaccine as soon as they are offered it, rather than waiting to get both at once



Supporting and increasing flu uptake

- Across the NENC ICS, pregnant women and 2-3 year olds require targeted support to improve uptake
- Nationally a number workstreams share best practice guidance and lessons learned to tackle inequalities
- Regional pilots to support vaccination in nursery settings
- In Northumberland, a local enhanced service has been commissioned to:
 - incentivise PCNs to increase care home and housebound vaccinations, including enabling better data sharing and vaccine availability
 - Encourage vaccination of all clinical and non-clinical frontline health and social care workers, and those on the Learning Disabilities register
- Example of local integrated delivery: maternity services offering flu, COVID-19, and pertussis vaccines at antenatal clinics to all eligible patients

System working and integrated delivery

- Wide network of providers and partners working together to maximise uptake and protect our residents: GPs, PCNs, Community Pharmacies, Hospitals, Community Services, Local Authority, VCSE organisations etc.
- Northumberland Vaccine Collaborative continues to meet regularly to troubleshoot any issues and enable effective partnership working
- NENC Vaccination Board led by the ICB to ensure consistent delivery of programmes across our local system
- Reducing inequalities is a key priority local providers and partners are best placed to work with their communities and neighbourhoods to tailor key messages and promote access and uptake
- Northumberland has a strong record of high uptake but we must not become complacent, especially with potential 'vaccine fatigue' and the threat of a winter "twindemic" of COVID-19 and flu



Key messages for our residents

- Those at greater risk will need extra protection this winter
- The flu vaccination & COVID-19 booster will be critical to protecting lives
- If you are offered both vaccines together, it is safe to have them at the same time
- However, people are encouraged to get their vaccinations as soon as possible, in order to be fully protected, rather than waiting to get both together
- For COVID-19 boosters, if the appointments available via the National Booking Service or 119 are inconvenient:
 - Keep checking to see what is available as new appointments are added regularly as supplies are confirmed
 - OR wait to be contacted by your GP or PCN to book an appointment locally
- There will be enough vaccines for all eligible patients
- Please be patient, you will not be missed
