Scremerston needs a school

To whom it may concern,

I would like to express my shock and outrage at the proposed closure of Scremerston First School.

As a rural school, Scremerston is the heart of the local community and provides a warm and nurturing environment for the children who attend. These are all factors which are documented and praised within the Ofstead school inspection of July 2021, with the 'family feel within the community' being highlighted.

Scremerston is one of only six rural schools in our area and given its close proximity to Berwick-upon-Tweed it ought to be considered vital to our schooling system. As a rural school, the setting offers something unique to its Berwick-based alternatives, something which parents are choosing for their children by travelling beyond their catchment areas to enrol. In comparison to the other rural schools in the Berwick Partnership, Scremerston consistently has a larger student body, higher forms of entry per year group, and higher planned admission number year on year than at least three of the other schools, yet is inexplicably the only one set for closure. We cannot help but question the lack of logic behind this proposal and why section 65 of the Outcomes of Consultation which details Rural Schools and the Presumption Against Closure has been ignored. Seven factors are detailed for consideration before a decision is made to close a rural school and, from what we can see, the closure of Scremerston misaligns with all of these.

All of the staff at Scremerston are caring and committed, providing a nurturing educational setting and unparalleled emotional support. Should a child or parent need anything at all, the staff are approachable and kind, offering support and advice however they can. It is this hard work and dedication that has consistently earned Scremerston a GOOD Ofstead rating, a rating which the school has held for many years. Within the report, the school is praised for pupils' good behaviour, their excitement to learn, lack of bullying, excellent safeguarding practices, the wide variety of memorable experiences on offer, the support of SEND children and their families, and of course the curriculum itself - and this is far from an exhaustive list. It is hard to believe anyone could read this report and still find the closure of Scremerston First School to be an acceptable option.

Strong teacher-parent relationships are proven to be a big factor in how successful a child will be in school. These relationships understandably take time to build and should Scremerston close those already cultivated will be lost instantly. Whether SEND or not, children who need extra support will be stripped of their familiar environment. Indeed, moving schools is a turbulent and upsetting time for even the most resilient of children and studies have shown that children who move schools often have lower self-esteem and a lowered sense of belonging.

While we appreciate that many children enrolled at Scremerston do not live within the catchment area, and perhaps this is part of what has fuelled the decision, we can only see this is a positive attribute to the school. Parents are choosing Scremerston First School. The school is extremely popular and loved by the community, and for many living in town it is the only viable rural school their children have the option of attending. It would be a tragedy to have this choice taken away from parents and see the children forced in to schools which were not the families' first option.

While not mentioned in the Outcomes of Consultation report, the closure of Scremerston First School would undoubtedly go hand in hand with with closure of Lucky Ducks Pre School which operates on site. Again, this would be a huge loss to the local community and would result in yet more children being displaced and a greater number of staff facing the very real threat of unemployment.

We cannot help but wonder at the timing of this announcement and whether it has been planned to intentionally damn the school. This month, parents of 2023 reception children are due to start applying for school places but it seems a certainty that parents will be deterred from applying to a school which may not stay open. As we fight for our school to remain open, it would be appalling for the NCC to use the lack of applications against us given that this would not have been the case under normal circumstances.

It is undeniable that due to COVID the past few years have been a turbulent time for everyone but given the long term closure of schools and period of home learning, it is arguable that children have been affected most of all. Further disruption for such young, impressionable minds would surely have a negative impact on their long term education. Instead, our children deserve to be allowed to learn and grow in an environment in which they are already comfortable, without being separated from the friends and teachers they have known since their schooling began.

Instead of closing a perfectly good rural school with a wonderful reputation, we cannot help but think that time and money would be better spent improving the schools within the Berwick Partnership which are known to actually be struggling, if not outright failing. Instead of disrupting the learning and lives of Scremerston pupils, surely efforts should be turned to aiding schools and children that are desperately in need of support?

We urge you: please reconsider closing this wonderful school. Scremerston First School is still more than viable with a good budget and a good intake of children who we do not want to see displaced and torn from their friends and teachers. As a community, we vow to stand alongside the school for as long as it should exist and can assure you that we will fight tirelessly to keep the doors open.



We as parents are very upset and disappointed about the possible closure of Scremerston first school. It is a brilliant school, with great staff.

It just doesn't make sense to close a perfectly good school, which serves the rural and some of the town community. It seems unjustified and illogical.



It remains a mystery to myself and others as to why Scremerston first school should face closure. Many children benefit from the smaller class sizes that Scremerston has to offer. My own children included. They did not start school at Scremerston. I decided to move them there at the end of last year, after researching and even visiting other schools within the area to decide on a good fit. My son has struggled in the past with school and really didn't enjoy it at all in the past. He didn't receive the support that he needed to make sure he felt like he belonged at his last school and that affected his home life too. He struggled socially and academically but since moving schools he is like a different child. While he still has some difficulties he is being well supported through them and the staff are always there to speak to. He is now happy to attend school and really enjoying his lessons. He no longer comes home stressed out from his school day. Both children are thriving and actually enjoying their education since moving and I think it is a real shame to close a school that really tries their hardest to meet the needs of the children. I know myself and many others send our children to Scremerston despite being out of the catchment area in order to access the brilliant environment provided. It should also be noted that while I do not object to religion being taught in schools we should all have the freedom to choose schools which are not church schools. Not every family is religious and of those who are some are not Christian. Closing one of the few schools in the area which is not a c of e school takes that choice from families. If that is not enough to make you stop and think, consider this; do we need to further disrupt the children whose education has already had such a rocky start due to covid restrictions, lockdowns and forced isolations? Many of our children have struggled with social and academic difficulties that they otherwise would not have had to deal with, and now they face uncertainty once again. Those who were already likely to struggle have had a harder time receiving the support they should have had. Scremerston school go above and beyond to support their students and I feel that it is unfair to close them with no evidence to suggest that they deserve it.



Sorry it's taken so long to write. Hope it's better late than never!

Our children attend Scremerston First School as we live within its catchment area, and we are extremely fortunate that we do.

Scremerston is a fantastic rural school and our children receive a first class education from staff that know them well. Like many village schools, Scremerston has a family-like environment and the children are well looked after and valued. There is a strong community and our children feel part of it. The smaller class sizes suit our children and ensure they are never overlooked or lost within a crowd. They enjoy going to school and its wonderful to watch them grow in confidence and be enthusiastic about learning.

Many rural schools face falling pupil rolls due to a number of factors, but Scremerston has successfully managed to not only keep the pupils living within its catchment, but also attract pupils out-with the area. It makes no sense to close a rural school with a healthy pupil roll, happy children, excellent staff and great results.

We simply wouldn't choose to send our two children to a school further away, in town with larger class sizes, it would not be the right fit for them; Scremerston first school is the best place for them, as it is for many other families in the Berwick area.

As a toddler, my son was extremely shy, afraid of the noises that other children made, be that a baby crying, a toddler laughing or children shouting while they played; he'd immediately cover his ears and the experience would often reduce him to tears. This school changed that.

Before the pandemic he attended Lucky Ducks and we soon began to see changes in him, his exposure to a small group of children in a nursery setting began to bring him out of his shell and he started to interact with others. Then when the pandemic struck, and he was no longer exposed to the schools small community it had a very obvious effect and he began to once again become upset by noise made by his younger sister.

After lockdown, he returned to the school as a first year student, and it was the changes that the school made and the support he received from the staff that helped him to adjust to school life once again. Initiatives like 'playground pals', which encourages children to play together and actively stops anyone feeling alone or left out.

A school of around 80 means that all of the teaching staff have the opportunity to get to know all of the children, rather than just those who are in their immediate care and therefore have a sense for when something is not right and can act on that, in the best interests of the child.

We have seen firsthand how important this familiarity is, with my son's shy disposition, Mrs Smith and Miss Ridley brought in an assessor to consider any additional support that they could provide in order to help him integrate with his fellow students — and for clarity, there were no recommendations, the school were already providing all relevant options of support - and we are really pleased at how readily he will now join in and enjoy group activities. His attention span, confidence and social skills have all dramatically increased through the encouragement, care and support given by the staff here at Scremerston.

I am concerned that with the current proposals, in three years time my son will be preparing to go to a high school, with a much larger pupil base, where, no matter the ratings of the school, one cannot argue that the familiarity with teachers that children experience in first and middle schools is extremely difficult to achieve, and is very unlikely to be sought by the schools governing body; as the conclusion of their time at those institutions is a series of exams, on which they will rely as they are propelled into their adult lives.
